Re: Key findings from a statewide survey of Ohio voters

The Tarrance Group is pleased to present these key findings from a statewide survey of Ohio voters. This survey was conducted June 22-24 and 26-27, 2021 among N=800 registered voters in Ohio, including N=600 registered voters statewide and an oversample of N=200 voters in coal producing counties. The margin of error for the statewide sample is $\pm 4.1\%$.

This data shows that Ohio voters support the bipartisan infrastructure package as it provides benefits that a majority of Ohio voters want like safe roads, a reliable electrical grid, affordable and reliable broadband, targeted workforce development programs, needed research and development along with support for clean energy programs. After being informed of the substance of the bill, there is strong majority support among all voters statewide (64%).

As seen below, there is broad consensus among Ohio voters on key themes like

Workforce retraining programs are an important way to make certain that workers do

Promoting clean energy will allow us to continue to get all the energy we need while	
also improving the environment.	69%

In addition, there is broad agreement among Ohio voters overall and among Republican voters as well as among coal county voters on the value of some of the key items in the bipartisan infrastructure bill like land conservation efforts, public transportation, modernization of the electric grid, expanded access to broadband, clean of brown field sites, and needed preparations for natural disasters. These voter sentiments are summarized in the chart below.

In sum, Ohio voters, including Ohio Republicans and coal county voters, recognize the value and the need for improved infrastructure programs. This awareness leads to broad support for programs that meet these needs.
